Recent projects include the University of<br>Otago Innovation Centre, Millbrook houses and St Moritz Hotel. Its<br>drawings archive is a national treasure of architectural history. |

| 9 June  | McAuliffe Stevens Architects: technical architecture<br>-Craig McAuliffe, Principal<br>Craig McAuliffe's and Preston Steven's work is mainly concentrated in<br>Dunedin and Central Otago, with other builds in Canterbury and Southland.<br>A particular interest is technical architecture, such as medical facilities.<br>Latest project is modernising the Forsyth Barr building in the Octagon.  |
